Seeing the face of God. The idea is intriguing, terrifying, and a longing so deep we are barely even

aware of it. Moreover, God wants to show Himself to us but understands that He, in all His glory, is way too much for us to comprehend. So He came to us clothed in human flesh: Jesus, God with His glory toned down enough that we can stand to be in His presence without fainting away. Thus, Philip could ask to see the Father, and Jesus could explain that the Father had been with them all along.



Whether or not we recognize it, we all are desperate to see God. Yet the thought rarely crosses our conscious minds before it skitters away, shy as a will-o-the-wisp. We want it; we are petrified of it. Why? Perhaps it's because my seeing God implies God seeing me.

And then I fly into paroxysms of foolishness. Do I want God to see me? Yes, no! But He's God. Of course, He sees me, right into the heart of me, all the time. He sees not only my actions but my intentions, my mixed motives, my quandaries and questionings, my sin and doubts. So, yes, it is scary to think of God seeing me.

Yet God also sees my desire for Him, my stumbling steps toward obedience, and all the beauty He put into my being. God sees the way I am fearfully and wonderfully made—body, mind, and soul—and He rejoices in me. That is awesome in the truest sense of the word.

We can't hide from God, and to be honest, we don't really want to because there is nothing more satisfying than being known—in all we are—and loved for all of it. And deep inside we have a sneaking suspicion that God has made us for exactly that: to be fully known and loved by Him.

Intriguing, terrifying, and oh-so wonderful.
